The Library's Document Delivery service provides copies of articles from books and journals to Fellows and Corporate Affiliate companies as well as nonmembers.



E-Book News - Atlas of benthic foraminifera



In March we launched our new E-Book collection, which gives Fellows access to 20 electronic books using Athens Passwords (the same login details used to access ejournals).

Four of the books are new additions to the Library and unique to the E-Book collection, including *Atlas of benthic foraminifera*. With 300 state-of-the-art photo-micrographs of common deep-sea benthic foraminifera species spanning the interval from Jurassic - Recent, this volume is intended as a reference and research resource for post-graduate students in micropalaeontology, as well as professional stratigraphers, paleontologists, and palaeoceanographers.

Smith vs. Greenough - a new exhibit



Much has been written about the competing ideas and maps of the Geological Society's first President, <u>George</u> <u>Bellas Greenough</u>, and <u>William Smith</u>, whose geological map of England and Wales is 200 years old this year.

Did Greenough plagiarise Smith's map? Was Smith a stubborn loner? Was there a whiff of elitism in Smith's absence from the Geological Society's gentlemanly membership rolls? Or were Smith and Greenough just two different types of scientist?

Find out by visiting a new exhibit in the Lower Library at

Burlington House, which explores the contrasting approaches to geological mapping of the two men, with maps and other items from the Society's collection. The small display can be viewed at the Geological Society, Burlington House, Piccadilly, London, W1J 0BG until 30th October.

Open House - Saturday 19 September




