



New E-Books - Africa, Afghanistan & Ethiopia



Three new titles have been added to the Library's <u>e-book collection</u>, exclusively for Fellows of the Society.

Geological atlas of Africa summarises the geology of Africa with a geological map of each country alongside information on the stratigraphy, tectonics, economic geology, geohazards, geosites and geoscientific education particular to that country and region.

Natural resources in Afghanistan details Afghanistan's physical geography — climate, soils, vegetation, water, hazards, and basic geological background and terrain landforms — together with details of its natural resources, ethnic problems, and relevant past histories.

Landscapes and landforms of Ethiopia is the first comprehensive source of scientific information on Ethiopia's geomorphological landscapes to be published in many years, with essential information about geology and tectonic framework, past and present climate, hydrology, geographical regions and long-term geomorphological history.

Geology of the Moon now online



On Friday 23 October, in collaboration with the Royal Astronomical Society, the Library hosted a recreation of the 28th William Smith lecture, originally given by the US astronaut <u>Harrison H Schmitt</u> on 19 December 1973.

Over 60 people were in attendance to watch the special remastered screening in the Upper Library where, through the wonders of 1970s video technology, Schmitt was beamed live from 1973 to once again present his lecture "Apollo and the geology of the Moon". The evening concluded with an update of the lecture, kindly provided

by Dr Schmitt himself, and read by Dr Natasha Stephens from Plymouth University, who also delivered a presentation on developments in lunar exploration since the Apollo missions.

<u>GeoRef</u> contains over 3.6 million references to geoscience journal articles, books, maps, conference papers, reports and theses, and it continues to grow by more than 100,000 references a year.

The database can be accessed on PCs in the Library, and you can download, print or email your search results.

New journal - *Review of palaeobotany and palynology*




Building with Clay showcases over twenty industrial bricks, tiles and pipes, made from clay derived from a variety of source rocks between the 17th century and the present day,

with details of their construction, uses and the brick-making companies who created them.
