When Gavrilo Princip fired his gun in Sarajevo in 1914, killing Archduke Ferdinand of Austria and his wife Sophie, he unleashed a series of events that led to the First World War. But why did that single event precipitate a catastrophe, and bring about the death, not only of tens of millions of people, but the whole European social order? And what does this have to do with the extinction of the dinosaurs? In this talk I shall explore how simple, single causes (such as the impact of an asteroid) cannot alone bring about mass extinctions, as physicists, wielding Occam's Razor, might prefer. That explanation may be simple, but simple explanations of complex systems behave are doctrinaire and wrong.
